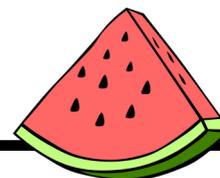

The 17th annual Wood County Living History Day will be held on Sunday, August 23 at 2 pm, at the Wood County Historical Center. The 2020 honorees are:

- **Charles Summer VanTassel**—Author of “Pioneer Scrapbook of Wood County”
- **George Murray Brown**—Wood County Sheriff (1882-1887), oversaw the hanging of Carl Bach (Wood County Courthouse) and Arthur J Glover (Ohio Penitentiary).
- **Peter Kramp**—The “Oil Prince of Wood County”
- **Dr John Whitehead**—Prominent doctor in early Wood County; remembered by the Cuning and Whitehead Building in Downtown Bowling Green
- **Harriet Covert Battles**—President of the first Wood County Women’s Suffrage Club
- **Dottie Zimmerman**—A teacher fo 50 years starting with the Portage Village one-room school, Weston Township DeWeese, and Weston School
- **Elizabeth LaFarrie**—A pioneer wife who overcame death and disease to clear the swamp in 1832.

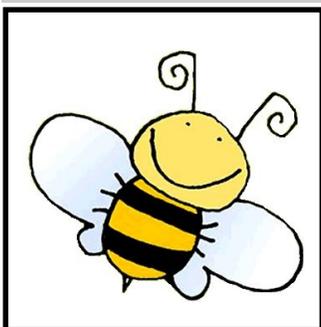

From Portage Yesteryear...

Sheriff Breaks Counterfeiters

For some time it has been known that a gang of counterfeiters have been operating in Wood County.

About two years ago some of the gang were captured near Dunbridge and for a time the circulation of counterfeit was stopped. Of late the merchants and businessmen of Portage have been bothered with bogus quarters, dollars and nickles [sic]. Sheriff Bryant was notified and by employing a stool-pigeon worked a clue.

Last night at eight o'clock, Bryant received a message from Portage, to come, that everything was ready; he with Deputy Deald and Marshall Fowler, departed for Portage. The Sheriff had been working the clue for some time but had not said a word to anybody and no one knew where they were going until they reached the Daniel Mears farm, in section 8, Portage Township. Back into the woods they went to a shanty; a dim light was shining through the window. The it broke on Doc's associates that they were after a gang of counterfeiters.

The officers peered through the window; they saw a man working at the crucible and moulding [sic] metal into coins. They watched for at least an hour and finally the counterfeiter dropped down onto the bed.

The time had come to enter the hut; the sheriff kicked the door in and before the counterfeiter could move he was bound. The hut was searched and metal moulds [sic] and several counterfeit coins were found, in fact a whole outfit was captured, The dollars were very unperfect.

The man was loaded into the vehicle and brought to Bowling Green and lodged in jail.
